Discussion with CRASIQ and UTAPI Consultants: Presentation of French-language tools to promote equitable, trauma- and violence-informed care.

Summary

The COVID-19 pandemic has dramatically affected the health needs of people who use services. This heightened public attention to public health challenges has spotlighted the issues surrounding equity of access and services in the healthcare system. Against this backdrop, EQUIP Health Care has developed accessible tools to help healthcare providers to offer equitable, trauma-and violence-sensitive care. This presentation will present share some of these tools, available in French, and the process of adapting a first series of tools focusing specifically on mental health and health equity to the Quebec context. These resources are aimed at a wide range of people working in health intervention, as well as managers and students.

Joannie Gill Founder and director of UTAPI Consultants Master's student in nursing at Université de Montréal.

I am a woman from the Pekuakamiulnuatsh First Nation, of Innu and Québécois descent. I began practicing in pediatrics, perinatology, and active geriatrics at my local hospital. I then practiced in Mashteuiatsh for 4 years at the community health center, where I worked as a nurse in the healthy lifestyle and chronic disease program. I'm currently enrolled at Université de Montréal in the Master's program in Nursing, under Amélie Blanchet Garneau's supervision. My research topic will focus on "Implementing an assessment framework for cultural safety training development and delivery". I am also the founder and director of UTAPI Consultants, whose mission is to support a process of compassionate decolonization in the Francophone population by accompanying change with individuals, managers, students, teachers, and professionals allied to the causes and rights of First Peoples.



Amélie Blanchet Garneau Associate Professor, Faculty of Nursing, Université de Montréal Holder of the Quebec Indigenous Research Chair in Nursing

I am a white settler of French ancestry, living and working on the unceded and stolen lands of the Kanien'kehá:ka Nation. I have been a registered nurse since 2004 and an associate professor at the Faculty of Nursing at Université de Montréal since 2013. I hold a master's degree in community health from Université Laval, a Ph.D. in nursing from Université de Montréal and a post-doctorate from the University of British Columbia. In partnership with Indigenous and non-Indigenous academics, leaders and practitioners, my research program aims to decolonize health professionals' education and practice to promote Indigenous health equity. CRASIQ contributes to building the capacity of healthcare professionals to counter Indigenous-specific racism and discrimination in healthcare settings and create a practice context that enables them to do so.
